
TUESDAY ALIVE Some of the group of 12 persons from Garden Spot Village told of their experiences in Kenya which they visited in February. Six from the group sponsor school children through the agency of Mission of Hope International (MOHI)

MOHI gives students two meals a day as well as free education for children in the slums. 99% of support comes from sponsorships and 1% from a water treatment system. The high school boarding school grows their own vegetables. At the skills train-

ing center electric, plumbing, cosmetology, etc. are taught.

Some highlights included:

- Being invited by MOHI and the amount of preparation "hoops" as the group gathered daily for prayer, help with paperwork, support mentally and emotionally. Team leaders Karyn Nancaris, GSV chaplain, and Brandon Adams, GSV



- Meeting with the 17 children sponsored by GSV people. The team did special things with them at the beginning of the week. They went to a giraffe center. Many of the children had never had a bus ride or eaten at a restaurant or been outside the slums

- Holding a two day VBS for a hundred 4th graders. The children were given cloth tote bags made by someone at GSV. The children eagerly participated in acting out the Bible stories that demonstrated God's love.
- Creating a large movable mural with the team and children featuring handprints as background and silhouettes of children forming the letters MOHI.
- Following a performance of native dances by the high school students, the team was asked to teach some

American dances. To the delight of the students, the team obliged by showing them the Cuban Shuffle and the Chicken dance.

- The team also went on a Masai Mara Safari and then visited the Masai village. The tribe's old religion was based on two gods; black represented a mostly benevolent god and red a vengeful god. Most Masai have been Christian for many years.

INTERFAITH PARTNERS CONGREGATION PLEDGE

This pledge is in keeping with our congregational mission statement to "share God's love with all of creation." It is also in keeping with the creation of the pollinator garden which adds beauty and solid conservation practices to our campus. Creation care has developed as one of our congregational priorities and has been led by Heidi. Thank-you, Heidi!

EDUCATING OURSELVES ABOUT THE

HOUSING CRISIS: United Way hosted a panel addressing hidden populations experiencing housing insecurity as well as what city and county agencies are doing to try to address the issues.

Aging population: The population in the country is aging, not just a baby-booming surge, but a permanent shift in the population. 77% of seniors want to stay in their own homes, but the housing stock, especially in Lancaster City,

doesn't match the need. Home sharing of seniors with other seniors or matching seniors with college and/grad students is one creative way communities are addressing this issue.



The ALICE (Asset, Limited, Income,



ADMIRATION COMMISSION REPORTING

Foundation Document: Considerable time has been spent over the past almost three years working to update the church's foundation document which describes the church structure and functioning. The work was to simplify and right size the structure, as well as to adjust it to better serve the current congregation and these changing times. The work of the commission on this document is now complete and approval of the updated document will be on a future a congregational agenda.

The decision to add a pastoral advisory council and the change to a Ministry Leadership Group focused around IN, UP, and OUT, which is part of this document, has already been approved by a vote of the congregation.

Reserve Fund Policy: Administration Commission adopted a policy that withdrawing money from the reserve fund will require the approval of the commission.

MC USA Delegate Assembly: Agenda for this delegate session was reviewed to better understand what is on the agenda for discernment at this Kansas City meeting. The traditional Anabaptist understanding of the congregation and perhaps the conference being the center of discernment rather than the national body was mentioned as the Membership Guidelines were noted.

Accessibility: We discussed parts of the physical plant that are not easily handicap accessible. There was no action taken.

Table Fellowship Sundays: At this point, three table fellowship Sundays are planned for this summer. The current plan is for these to take place in the multipurpose room and include singing, a shorter sermon and table interaction. Some congregations are planning church services that are more participatory, which is in keeping with changes that have occurred in schools. How do we keep the best of the traditional style of service and also incorporate more table fellowship? A local ACC congregation has begun to have regularly scheduled table fellowship Sundays and others are removing pews to allow more flexibility and creativity in planning church services. This summer we will experience both as we meet in the sanctuary and in the multipurpose room. Please keep these and all of our Sunday services and congregational activities in your prayers.

Table Fellowship Sundays are scheduled on July 3, July 24 and August 21.
