## **Snacks and Restorative Justice ...by Jill Heine**

In my role as Restorative School Practitioner at McCaskey High School, word is spreading among the students that I have free snacks available. I've found that snacks are a tool to build relationships with students, and I'd love to share an example that has brought me so much joy.


Three senior students routinely stop by for snacks and conversation. Over the months, our conversations have covered topics like translating Gen Z vocabulary, using AI to create a text response to a romantic partner during a conflict situation, applying to college, when and how the frontal lobe is fully developed in humans, and what constitutes the perfect holiday meal.

The day after a holiday break, two of the three came in to say hello and check out my snack stash. After a bit of conversation, one student left for lunch while the other remained. The remaining student shared his interests, goals, and the lessons he learned in life.

As I acknowledged and affirmed him, he eventually shared how he is currently on parole for actions he regrets. The more he talked, I wondered if Advoz was part of his parole requirements. He said the name sounded "sorta" familiar and then with quick recognition said, "is that the tall building in the city?" I confirmed and he went on to talk about having the meeting with the person he harmed there. I mentioned that I'm employed by that same organization. He thought that was cool! He explained how he is working to pay restitution and the changes he has made in his life since the harm. He shared how he's learned to surround himself with people who support his goals and to not "hang" with the wrong crowd. I shared a quote from last year's McCaskey MLK Jr. Scholarship Fund banquet speaker:

"Show me your friends and I will show you your future. Find People who see your destiny, not your past. You also need to own all of who you are."

He said, "exactly!"



**Finance Corner** December was a good month in making progress toward our budgeted goals for the fiscal year. We are grateful for generous giving that enabled us to meet and exceed goals. Thank you for your faithful financial stewardship that enables ministry at Ridgeview, across the street and around the world.

**Joining Together** Generous giving enabled surpassing the \$8,000 goal with total giving for this program of \$10, 611!

**Jamaica Hurricane Relief Fund** A fund is open until the end of January to aid a congregation whose church building suffered damage in the hurricane. Sam Walters has connections to this congregation which is part of the Mennonite Church in Jamaica.
